NURSING CLUB Works With Local BREAST CANCER SURVIVOR

to Transform Consultation Room



Jacquie Brown sat in a barren consult room, waiting to talk again with her surgeon. Breast cancer had uprooted her plans for the year. And this consult room, with its uncomfortable chairs, ugly furniture, and mismatching colors, was bringing its own layer of discouragement. Nothing here was sparking hope.

This lifeless space was not Brown's responsibility, but as a local florist (IG: @petalpusherschatt), she knew how beauty and vibrant color could spark hope in such a space. This room needed nothing less than a total makeover. After her recovery from surgery, she started her own GoFundMe in hopes of making it happen. A few donations came in, but it wasn't enough to make her full vision happen.

In October, the student leadership team for

Southern Adventist University's Nursing Club learned of this need and rallied behind it. Students worked diligently in October (Breast Cancer Awareness Month) to raise funds among their classmates for this transformation. As Brown relentlessly cut through layers of red tape, School of Nursing (SON) students got creative in finding new ways to increase awareness and raise money, reaching a total of \$577 raised in four weeks.

The fundraiser attracted the attention of more than just nursing students. Former SON dean, Barbara James, felt a soft spot in her heart for the project, having lost her own sister, Christine, to breast cancer. She contacted Brown and made her own generous donation to the project, opening doors to move the project forward.

In April, Brown was able to see her dream come true. Thanks to her dedication and relentless persistence, the consult room is no longer a room of mismatched furniture and old paint. It is beautiful space with inspiring art, quotes, colors, and comfortable furniture (including a teamaking station). Everything was carefully designed to convey the hope she wants to share, even down to the small note in Christine's honor by the electric kettle, "But first, tea.—Love, Christine Elizabeth."

"It's a great feeling to really make a difference for these patients. I'm so glad everyone is getting to experience this," Brown wrote. "Fundraising efforts through the Nursing Club made a tremendous difference—we truly couldn't have created such a beautiful, uplifting space without you."





NEW ADVENTHEALTH PARTNERSHIP

RQI stands for Resuscitation Quality Improvement. While basic life support (BLS) cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training is typically valid for two years, research shows that much is forgotten during that time, and resuscitation outcomes are improved with more frequent training. Many hospitals accomplish this through RQI programs, where providers engage in quarterly online and hands-on training.

This year, AdventHealth agreed to sponsor our faculty and students as part of their RQI program. We currently have two stations with adult and infant resuscitation models and are already so excited about this generous partnership. This is a great boost to skills, confidence, and competence. MISSION TRIPS



Many Southern students have opportunities for short-term mission trips that broaden their views of the world, other cultures, and serving God through medical, evangelistic, or other means.

The Population and Community Health class makes a trip to Manchester, Kentucky, during the fall and winter semesters. They assist with the Healthy Homes Initiative, helping to ensure home safety. They also offer health screenings and teaching. Projects such as handicap ramp installation increase safety, quality of life, and mobility.

The Evangelism Resource Center (ERC) and School of Nursing combined resources to offer medical care and evangelism during a trip to Majamarca, Peru, May 15-June 2. Participants saw God at work in relocating misplaced passports, providing safe travels, keeping plane doors open just long enough to allow the group to board at the last minute, healing students who were sick (including two who were hospitalized), guiding care for more than 1,300 patients when only 600 were expected, and completing student-led evangelistic sessions at 20 churches.
